WORSHIP WITH US IN MAY:

<u>Peccata Mundi</u>, whose name means "Sins of the World," our Lent caterpillar, has become Salvador Mundi, our Easter Butterfly, a name which means "Savior of the World" in celebration of Christ's gift of liberation from sin and death, revealed in his resurrection on Easter.

Please join us for Worship every Sunday at 10 AM. Please bring a relative, friend, co-worker, or neighbor. Be bold and invite a stranger! All are welcome!

May 4th, The Third Sunday of Easter:

The disciples make a big splash and eat breakfast with the risen Jesus. Wading in the water (remembering baptism) and eating with Jesus (celebrating holy communion) is our weekly encounter with the risen Christ. Jesus asks us again and again: Do you love me? And Jesus invites us, again and again, to follow him, bringing the Easter life to all people.

May 11th, The Fourth Sunday of Easter (Mother's Day):

We sometimes call this day Good Shepherd Sunday. The gift of new life is the gift of the risen Christ, whose sheep hear his voice and follow him into eternal life. It was true for Dorcas in Joppa. It was true for those "who have come out of the great ordeal" in the Revelation vision. It is true for us and for all the baptized: Surely goodness and mercy shall follow me all the days of my life, and I will dwell in the house of the Lord forever.

May 18th, The Fifth Sunday of Easter:

Easter initiates a new day. It anticipates a new heaven and a new earth. The risen Christ is making all things new. In the mystery of holy baptism God has made new people of us. Today Jesus invites us to see everyone in a new light—through the lens of love.

May 25th, The Sixth Sunday of Easter:

Visions abound in the readings for the sixth Sunday of Easter. Paul has a vision about what to do. John has a vision of what will be. Jesus provides visions of a peace that surpasses human understanding and a power beyond human imagination.

June 1st, The Seventh Sunday of Easter:

It is possible to hear in Jesus' high priestly prayer, a prayer he offered shortly before his death, the petitions of the ascended Christ for his own throughout history—to our day—and beyond. Jesus prays for us. In holy baptism we become believers in God, have our robes washed din the flood of Christ's forgiveness, and receive the gift of life forever with all the saints.

IF YOU CANNOT BE PRESENT AT WORSHIP:

Pastor Pat is glad to bring Holy Communion to you! Our Services are live-streamed on our YouTube channel @patriciamedley4915 and a button to the recordings is on our website: GoodShepherdHolmdel.org. THE BISHOP'S CHALLENGE: CARE OF GOD'S GOOD CREATION:

We hope that you are trying some Meatless Mondays—or any day you choose. We asked Diane Didden for the recipe for the delicious cake she brought to the March Fellowship Lunch in honor of Mike DiPiazza. She says the recipe is from 1969. Here it is:

APPLE PECAN RING CAKE

1 cup butter or margarine	1 ½ tsp. baking soda	2 cups chopped pecans
2 cups sugar	¹ / ₂ tsp. salt	or walnuts, optional
3 eggs	1 tsp. cinnamon	
3 cups sifted flour	¹ / ₄ tsp. mace	
2 tsps. vanilla	3 cups chopped apples	

Cream butter and sugar until fluffy. Add eggs one at a time, beating well after each addition. Mix and sift flour, baking soda, salt, cinnamon and mace; add gradually. Stir in vanilla, apples and nuts. Batter will be stiff. Spoon into greased and floured 10" tube pan. Bake at 325 for 1 ½ hours (but check after one hour with cake tester, or it may be overdone.) Let cool in pan 10 minutes. Remove to rack. Enjoy.
