I had a wonderful experience visiting the Art Exhibit at Middletown West and got to see the amazing artwork by the students there, and in particular, our own Morgan Summey, who just completed 11th grade. When I am out in a store or at the mall and just happen to be wearing a clerical collar, I often will often say to a person who has served me, "God bless you!" I've had moderate success but the natural enemies of a gardener usually win the battle. Varmints, bugs and plant diseases were my downfall.

However, if you have never tried to grow vegetables at home, you are missing out on a great experience as well as a perfect chance to guarantee the freshest, tastiest food for your household. There is nothing like harvesting fresh vegetables from your own garden and then enjoying them as part of your daily menu. Give it a try.

Behold! I Make All Things New NJ Synod Assembly 2025 Recap

The NJ Synod met in Assembly on June 5-7 at the Hilton, East Brunswick. 376 voting members and 59 visitors worshiped, celebrated, elected a bishop, and conducted the synod's business during these days. Below is a brief recap of our time together.

Worship

We began the assembly with a service of Holy Communion. Bishop Bartholomew preached and presided, Vice-President Arundel Clarke assisted. Pastors new to the synod, along with lay members distributed communion. Assembly musician, Brian Conover (Reformation, Galloway/Absecon) provided accompaniment throughout the assembly and was assisted by James Harris on trumpet (synod treasurer) and Pastor Linnéa Clark on flute and drum (St. Mark, Hamilton). Pastor Kat Steinly (Zion, Oldwick) joined Pastor Clark in leading the assembly in Holden Evening Prayer on Friday evening. Thank you to all our worship leaders.

In addition to opening worship, we sang and prayed throughout the assembly, returning to the theme song, Behold! I Make All Things New by John Bell at the beginning of every plenary. Pray-ers at the beginning of our plenary sessions included Pastor Burton Vincent (celebrating the 65th anniversary of his ordination), Pastor Moacir Weirich and Nicole Krenz (St. Stephans Grace, Newark) who led us in a litany for immigrants, and Deacon Shirley Talluri (newly ordained chaplain at Hackensack Meridian Health Hospice).

Resolution/Memorials

We adopted one resolution and two memorials. The resolution calls us to oppose attacks on the civil liberties of transgender/nonbinary (TGNB) adults and children and to advocate for and protect our TGNB neighbors.

Memorial 1 calls for the ELCA to affirm transgender, nonbinary, gender expansive, two-spirit, and genderqueer people of God by speaking out on behalf of these neighbors and consulting with them as to the best ways to advocate with them.

Memorial 2 calls the ELCA to eliminate gendered language in all governing documents.

Both memorials now go to the Churchwide Assembly for action. The resolutions and memorials can be found on the synod website (njsynod.org/assembly).

Synod Council Elections

We elected the following members to serve on synod council:
