## **PASTOR PAT'S PONDERINGS**

On October 26th, we will celebrate Reformation Sunday and the contributions made by the reformer Rev. Dr. Martin Luther to our proud heritage. Luther's parents hoped that he would finish his education and become an attorney and support his parents in their old age. But Luther's conscience would not let him rest. He knew the Creed, and expected that when Christ returned to judge the living and the dead, he, being a sinner, would be "toast"! Luther knew that he was a sinner and could not be holy enough not to be judged. This made him angry at God. When he was nearly struck by lightning while riding his horse through a forest in a rainstorm, he was sure that God was aiming for him, and vowed to become a monk. It was not until he started reading the Bible that he discovered how amazing God's grace is. Most Germans had never read the New Testament, which only existed at that time in Greek and Latin. Translating the Bible into a "common" tongue, such as one used at work or in the kitchen was illegal and translators were burned at the stake, but Luther was highly educated. What he read in the Bible stunned him.

In our Bible Study group on Zoom, we are studying Paul's Letter to the Romans, which was one of the eyeopening, faith-restoring passages that freed Luther from his guilt, shame and fear. Paul writes: "But now, apart from the law, the righteousness of God has been disclosed and is attested by the Law and the Prophets, the righteousness of God through the faith of Jesus Christ for all who believe. For there is no distinction, since all have sinned and fall short of the glory of God; they are now justified by his grace as a gift, through the redemption that is in Christ Jesus, whom God put forward as a sacrifice of atonement by his blood, effective through faith. ... We hold that a person is justified by faith apart from works prescribed by the law." (Romans 3:21-28)

The grace of God, given to us by Christ Jesus' death and resurrection, is a free gift, but it is not cheap, as Christ paid for it by giving his life. Therefore grace is a costly gift that shows us how much God treasures those who will put their trust in him.

Recently my husband did a wedding for a member of his congregation from an Indian family. Many of her family and friends are Hindus. As a part of the wedding sermon, he said that God is love and that God's grace shown to us shows us how to love. Marriage is one of the many ways that we pay forward the grace and forgiveness God has shown to us, which we do not deserve. When we mess up, we forgive one another. Loving and forgiving one another are hallmarks of Christian marriage. In the parking lot, a Hindu couple approached us and said how remarkable grace is. In the Hindu religion, they said, one must live up to expectations and keep on trying to get it right—karma gets you every time, they said.

I hope you will help us celebrate this special day at Good Shepherd. It is not a day to celebrate the separations in the church catholic. When Luther posted his 95 Theses on the door of the Castle Church in Wittenberg and with the invention of Guttenberg's printing press, they were mailed all over the known world, asking for a scholarly discussion on the subject of indulgences, because he thought the pope might not know that forgiveness was being sold for cash in Germany, he was brought to trial, excommunicated and Pope Leo X put a price on his head. Luther did not break away from the Roman church to start his own. He was thrown out. When he died, he thought he was still a good Catholic, but he thought that his pope was not. Putting his trust

in the grace of Christ was the only saving thing to do. He was eager to translate all the scriptures into German and he did it while he was in hiding. Putting our trust in the grace of Christ is still the only saving thing to do and we are proud as Lutherans to say that this is the heart of our faith.

On Reformation Sunday, Holmdel will celebrate Heritage Day at Holmdel High School from 1-5 PM. I will be having a table there, to represent Germany and will be presenting our heritage proudly there and inviting people to our German Christmas Service. Want to join me? Let me know. People need to know about grace and such outreach can save souls.

THE 45<sup>TH</sup> ANNUAL RED BANK CROP HUNGER WALK will take place on Sunday, October 19<sup>th</sup> at Red Bank Regional High School, 101 Ridge Rd., Little Silver, NJ 07739, with registration at 1 PM and step off at 2 PM. 100% of the food and 25% of the funds raised support 14 local food pantries in Monmouth County and the remaining 75% of funds support the work of Church World Service in America and around the globe. Last year with about 300 walkers we raised \$120,000 and collected roughly 10,000 lbs. of food. This year, in recognition of our 45th year and the expanded needs of the community, our goal is to raise \$145,000 and collect 14,500 lbs. of food. Peanut butter, rice, beans, and soup are needed. Strollers are welcome, but dogs are not permitted on the school campus. There will be music, games, an art contest, the food drive, and refreshments. The five- mile route includes water stops. There is a tired walker van that can bring you back to the school parking lot. You can register on our team at www.crophungerwalk.org/redbanknj. Then click on Start or Join a Team: Type in Lutheran Church of the Good Shepherd - Holmdel. You can register yourself, make a gift, and begin to fundraise on social media. We hope that you are trying some Meatless Mondays—or any day you choose.

### Josephine's Caponata (Eggplant Appetizer)

Amanda Biddle's grandmother's recipe for the classic Italian eggplant appetizer is a delicious addition to any antipasto platter. This caponata is both sweet and tangy with a rich tomato base and a hint of salty brine from capers and olives. Pastor Pat recently made it with eggplants grown in Roy's garden. Recipe makes 2 quarts caponata and is easily halved.

Course: Appetizer Cuisine: Italian

Prep Time: 20 minutes Cook Time: 30 minutes Total Time: 50 minutes

Servings: 32 servings (1/4 cup) Calories: 61kcal

Ingredients:

- 1/2 cup olive oil
- 2-1/2 pounds eggplant, unpeeled and cut into 1/2-inch cubes
- 1 large onion, quartered and thinly sliced
- 2 stalks celery hearts (about 2/3 cup), thinly sliced
- 1 garlic clove, minced
- 6 ounces tomato paste (small can)
- 1 cup basic tomato sauce or crushed tomatoes in puree (such as Hunt's or Pomi; not pasta sauce)
- 2 cups water
- 1 teaspoon granulated sugar
- 1-1/2 teaspoons kosher salt plus additional to taste
- 1/4 teaspoon freshly-ground black pepper, plus additional to taste
- 1 cup pitted large green olives, halved\*
- 3 tablespoons capers, drained
- 1/4 to 1/3 cup golden raisins (depending on how sweet you like your caponata)
- 1/3 cup toasted pignoli nuts (2 oz package)
- 2 tablespoons red wine vinegar

#### Instructions:

- 1. Heat 1/4 cup oil in a large nonstick skillet over medium high heat until shimmering. Cook the eggplant cubes until they're tender, but don't lose their shape, about 8-10 minutes, gently stirring frequently.\*\* Transfer cooked eggplant to a bowl and set aside.
- 2. Heat remaining 1/4 cup oil. Sauté onions and celery until softened, about 10 minutes.
- 3. Stir in garlic and tomato paste and cook for 1-2 minutes. Add tomato sauce or crushed tomatoes/puree, water, sugar, salt, and pepper to the skillet and stir to combine. Lower heat and simmer for 15 minutes, stirring occasionally. Remove from heat and gently stir in eggplant, olives, capers, raisins, toasted pignoli nuts, and vinegar.
- 4. Cool, then transfer to an airtight container and refrigerate at least overnight to develop the flavors. Let stand at room temperature for about an hour before serving. Caponata keeps well for about a week, covered tightly, in the refrigerator.
- 5. Serve at room temperature with slices of crusty bread or assorted crostini toasts.
